
WE WELCOME ALL CHILDREN IN CHURCH, and we expect them to be children!

THANK YOU FOR YOUR GENEROSITY

The Mongolian Baby Quilt project is thriving thanks to your incredible support. Thank you very much for the many donations last Sunday at our "Sponsor a Baby Quilt" drive. I'm pleased to tell you that we far surpassed the original goal to cover the anticipated costs of batting for the quilts and shipping costs to send them and donated fabric in a container to Mongolia, (approximately \$500). \$985 was raised! We are humbled by your generosity. The additional funds will go into the Mongolia account to help with operating and maintenance costs of the Mongolian Quilting Center, including employing women who would otherwise be unemployed and in great need. We are also likely to exceed our goal for the number of baby quilts and by Sunday 28th April we should have 40-50 completed and ready to be blessed before they are shipped to Mongolia in a container in early May. We will have a sew-in day in the Parish Hall on Thursday 25th April to complete the bindings on 17 quilts. This requires hand sewing a hemming (or blind) stitch and no quilting experience is needed. EXCITING NEWS FROM CHAPLAINS ON THE HARBOR



Rich Myers and Steve Schmitz last week delivered a huge SUV load of nonperishable foods to the Community Center for Chaplains on the Harbor in Westport. The volunteers were more than thankful and appreciative.

Volunteers and part-time interns are, for the second year, working with Rev. Sarah to farm four acres. Lives are literally being saved by this program! As Rev. Sarah says, give someone a fish and they'll eat for a day - teach someone to fish and they'll eat for a lifetime! Chaplains on the Harbor is definitely teaching people to fish! Work on the farm gives young people who have discovered a purpose for living a way to earn an income and become independent. The vegetables and fruits from the farm are sold through shares to local patrons or donated to those in need. Last year the farm was cultivated with a lawn size tractor. With the help of St. Barnabas a large farm tractor has been purchased. See the pictures attached and thank you, St Barnabas for your huge contribution to making that tractor purchase possible!

GETTING TO KNOW EACH OTHER CHARLES HELMING MD - A MUSIC AND MEDICAL MAN

Parishioner Judy Tingley is interviewing parishioners and helping them to share a bit of their stories with us. This is the third in her series of stories - look forward to more of them in the future.

Thanks, Judy, for helping us get to know each other a bit better!

Charlie was introduced to choral singing when his medical school roommate persuaded him to join the choir of the chapel at Presbyterian Hospital in New York City. During his third year of medical school Charlie met Janice, a nurse working at Presbyterian, and at the end of medical school they were married. After medical school Janice and Charlie moved to Boston, where Charlie spent two years as an intern and surgical resident at Beth Israel Hospital. During this time son Timothy was born. The family then returned to New York and Columbia Presbyterian, where Charlie completed an orthopaedic surgery residency and a fellowship in joint replacement. While back in New York Janice and Charlie joined Christ Episcopal Church in Bronxville, and daughter Emily was born. At the time they met, Charlie had been "unchurched" since junior high school. Janice encouraged him to join the Episcopal church, where he found the sacramental nature of the liturgy to resonate with what had fascinated him during a history of Christianity course at Yale.

After Charlie completed his training, the family moved to Augusta, GA, where Charlie served two years at Eisenhower Army Medical Center. It had been clear from the beginning that Janice and Charlie shared a love of music, and both joined the choir of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Augusta. Though he had failed as a piano student (as many of us have) he enjoyed singing. The choir needed a bass and he could sing in tune. As he looks back Charlie appreciates that choir opportunities were formative events in his life with his wife and children.

In 1978 the family moved to Seattle, where Charlie joined the staff of Group Health. The great musical program under the leadership of Peter Hallock drew them to St. Marks, where Janice became part of the choir and Charlie rode her coat tails into the group as he had at St. Paul's. He has warm memories of his children joining with their parents in the choir loft at St. Marks, and credits that experience with fostering in both of them lifetimes of involvement with music. The family music keeps alive and beating, though Janice and Charlie are no longer singing at church. Emily sings (including serving as cantor at the Church of St. Mary the Virgin in New York) and plays the cello and guitar. Timothy is a free-lance classical percussionist.

After about twenty years with Group Health, Charlie retired, and he and Janice moved to Hansville. Shortly thereafter they joined St. Barnabas and Charlie soon joined the choir. In 2003 Charlie joined Virginia Mason doing office-based orthopaedics, primarily on Bainbridge. Though Charlie no longer sings regularly in the choir, he's a regular at the ten o'clock liturgy, and joined the choir for the recent Lenten Evensong. He's still definitely a musical man, but no longer a medical man with Virginia Mason. All of his past patients still miss him, his skills and his wonderful "bedside manner." Let's hope he'll be back in the choir again in the near future.
