GETTING TO KNOW SUSAN K. HYLEN

Sue grew up in Nashua, New Hampshire with three younger broth-



ers. Her family attended the Unitarian Universalist Church in Nashua, where her father served on the Board of Trustees and her mother taught Sunday school. What a great combination! Not all of Sue's relations were Unitarian Universalists. Instead of following his family to the Universalist Church, Sue's grandfather attended Good Shepherd Episcopal Church in Nashua and her Canadian aunt

and uncle attended the Anglican Church in Canada throughout their lives. They became a strong influence in Sue's spiritual journey.

An adventure seeker, Sue decided to move to Seattle. She attended the University of Washington where she completed her teaching degree — and met Stephen Hylen, her future husband. After graduating, Sue accepted a 6th grade teaching position with the Concrete School District. Over spring break in 1979, Sue and Stephen married and built a house on the beautiful Skagit River. And few years later, the traveling Hylens decided to move to Bainbridge Island where they raised their 2 daughters, Catherine Arnett Hylen & Stephanie Anne Hylen.

In her twenties, Sue had experienced an indefinable feeling, a need for something more. That feeling waned, but again, later in life, Sue felt that she needed something more, though she didn't comprehend exactly what that something more was. But in 1987, when her daughter Stephanie began attending St Barnabas Day School, Sue began attending St Barnabas Church. The beautiful historic sanctuary and the warm, welcoming congregation immediately drew her in. She quickly engaged in a variety of activities and studied for her confirmation. She had found that something more she had been seeking for so long.

In 1986, Sue began to attend the Bainbridge Island Writers Workshop, where poetry was taught by Bob McAllister and Nancy Rekow. In honor of her 50th birthday, she self-published Double Exposure, a book of poems and photographs.

WHAT IS THAT MONEY DOING ON THE ALTAR NEXT TO ALL THE HOLY THINGS?

At least one very thoughtful parishioner has voiced this question and there may be others of you who have similar questions. Perhaps you find the offering plates on the altar distracting. Perhaps you find them not "holy." Perhaps you think our focus during Holy Communion ought to be only on the bread and the wine. And perhaps you don't. But the question is a good one - Why is that most secular of all symbols - money - there on the altar when the bread and the wine are consecrated?

We too are imbued with God's divinity. We too are holy. It's why I always invite you to communion by saying "The gifts of the space you are renting. This helps us understand your God for the people of God. Holy things, for Holy people."

I insist that the money stay on the altar when the elements of communion are consecrated, because every penny in those plates represents us, represents something we gave up in our lives to put it there. In the offering we are offered the opportunity to give in to the amazing and wonderful impulse to be generous with ourselves and with all we've been given. The money we offer is a representation of our giving – sweat, body and blood. Yes, it is messy. Humans are messy. We are messy. But God in Christ Jesus came not just to be with us, but to become one of us. God incarnated in the very messiness of humanity. And we need to remember that we are God's chosen dwelling place. God makes everything holy.

Sometime ago we started passing the offering plate so that every single person could touch it, so every single person could be represented up there on the altar, so that every single person could be, in the act of communion, consecrated, made holy, set apart, for God. As Episcopalians, we believe that Jesus is really, truly present in the consecrated bread and wine. We also believe that Jesus is really truly present in each other. Remember that a sacrament is an outward and visible sign, and that leaving the offering plates on the altar - plates that every single one of you has touched – is a sign of our willingness not just to return all that God has given us, back to God, but also a sign of our becoming holy and set apart for God in the sacrament of Holy Communion. It's the same reason people who aren't ordained now stand at the altar when the consecration is happening. God has made us holy – not just the priest, but all of us. God has made us holy and the more ways we can remind ourselves of that, the more ways we can exemplify that, the more ways we can help the world to see that every single person is set apart, holy and precious to God, the more deeply we live into our vocations as Christians.
