Among friends, gathered round a table, Jesus took bread, and, having blessed it, he broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying,

“This is my body which is given for you.”

In the same way he took wine, and, having given thanks for it, he poured it out and gave the cup to his disciples, saying,

“This cup is the new relationship with God, sealed with my blood. Take this and share it. I shall drink wine with you next in the coming kingdom of God.”

So now, following Jesus' example, we take this bread and this wine; the ordinary things of the world through which God will bless us.

And, as Jesus offered thanks for the gifts of the earth, let us also celebrate God's goodness.

Lord Jesus Christ, present with us now, as we do in this place what you did in an upstairs room, breathe your Spirit upon us and upon this bread and this wine, that they may be heaven's food and drink for us, renewing, sustaining and making us whole, and that we may be your body on earth, loving and caring in the world.

For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.


The Bread is broken.

We pass the consecrated Bread to each other saying these words: "The Body of Christ, the Bread of Heaven."


After we have received the Bread, we enjoy dinner in silence, listening to music and readings from John's Gospel.

After supper the Presider says:

St. Luke tells us that as supper was ending, Jesus took the cup, filled it with wine and passed it among his friends, saying "This is my blood of the new covenant which is shed for you and for all for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, remember me."

We pass the Cup to each other saying these words: "The Blood of Christ, the Cup of Salvation".

After all have received the wine, we hear the sound of the bell and follow the Sacrament into the church, singing. Please find a pew at the front of the church and remain standing for the Gospel reading.

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John (13:1-17, 31b-35)

Glory to you, Lord Christ.

Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself.

Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet? Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

Jesus said, "Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.!



THE STRIPPING OF THE ALTAR

The church is now stripped of all signs of life. After the altar is stripped, it is then washed by the priest and the following hymn is sung. The stripped altar is a sign for us of the desolation Jesus experienced as all fled when he was arrested in the garden.

PSALMS 88 and 22 (sung by the choir)

The Gospel telling of Judas' betrayal is read. (Matthew 26:47-56)

While he was still speaking, Judas, one of the twelve, arrived; with him was a large crowd with swords and clubs, from the chief priests and the elders of the people. Now the betrayer had given them a sign, saying, 'The one I will kiss is the man; arrest him.' At once he came up to Jesus and said, 'Greetings, Rabbi!' and kissed him. Jesus said to him, 'Friend, do what you are here to do.' Then they came and laid hands on Jesus and arrested him. Suddenly, one of those with Jesus put his hand on his sword, drew it, and struck the slave of the high priest, cutting off his ear. Then Jesus said to him, 'Put your sword back into its place; for all who take the sword will perish by the sword. Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more than twelve legions of angels? But how then would the scriptures be fulfilled, which say it must happen in this way?' At that hour Jesus said to the crowds, 'Have you come out with swords and clubs to arrest me as though I were a bandit? Day after day I sat in the temple teaching, and you did not arrest me. But all this has taken place, so that the scriptures of the prophets may be fulfilled.' Then all the disciples deserted him and fled.

We need to be able to be with suffering (the true meaning of compassion ... *com* – with – *passion* – suffering) so we can take our part in healing it. Our noon service offers the traditional Good Friday liturgy with glorious music and veneration of the cross. Our 7pm service offers a string quintet featuring our own Judith Hanna, performing Joseph Haydn's musical meditations on the seven last words of Christ, along with prayers and veneration of the cross. Come, and find the truth of the goodness that is "Good Friday." Bring your worries, your sadnesses and prepare to experience the deepest riches of God's love. ***These services will not be streamed or recorded.***

THE GREAT VIGIL OF EASTER

APRIL 16TH, 8^{PM}

The Great Vigil of Easter is the most multi-sensory and thrilling ritual of the entire Christian year! In a festival of darkness and light, fire and water, images and symbols, singing and story-telling, we conclude our Triduum journey that is the mystery of dying and rising with Christ. Please note that incense will be used at this service.

The Light of Christ Comes into the World: We gather outside around the blazing New Fire, Christ's light returning to the world after the darkness of Good Friday. Following the flame of the Paschal Candle, we hear the singing of the *Exultet*, a haunting Easter chant from the ancient Church. Then, in the darkness of the parish hall's Story Space, our sacred stories come alive with powerful retellings of God's love for us through time and history. This year, several of the stories will be wonderfully cinematic, told on the big parish screen with dramatic images.

After the stories, we process to the church for Holy Baptism. Gathered round the font by candlelight, we will welcome 5 beautiful souls into the household of God. Then, with an outburst of joyful noise, the first Eucharist of Easter begins. As light fills the church, Alleluias are shouted, the organ plays, gongs are struck, and bells ring to celebrate our Risen Lord. Bring your own bells and noisemakers to join in! Finally, we will sing our favorite Easter hymns and share the Sacrament at God's table.

It's a night like no other—The Christian dreamtime, a luminous passage to the place of resurrection. Be there! Bring the family, or a friend who needs to hear the good news: *Death is conquered! We are free! Christ has won the victory!* **The journey is how we know. This service will not be streamed or recorded.**
