About Celtic Prayer and Spirituality






1 Timothy 2:1-7

First of all I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for everyone, for kings and all who are in little. everyone, for kings and all who are in high positions, so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. This is right and is acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, who desires everyone to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth. For

Luke 16:1-13

The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.

People Glory be to thee, O Lord.

Tesus said to the disciples, "There was a rich man who had a manager, and charges were $\mathcal I$ brought to him that this man was squandering his property. So he summoned him and said to him, 'What is this that I hear about you? Give me an accounting of your management, because you cannot be my manager any longer.' Then the manager said to himself, 'What will I do, now that my master is taking the position away from me? I am not strong enough to dig, and I am ashamed to beg. I have decided what to do so that, when I am dismissed as manager, people may welcome me into their homes.' So, summoning his master's debtors one by one, he asked the first, 'How much do you owe my master?' He answered, 'A hundred jugs of olive oil.' He said to him, 'Take your bill, sit down quickly, and make it fifty.' Then he asked another, 'And how much do you owe?' He replied, 'A hundred containers of wheat.' He said to him, 'Take your bill and make it eighty.' And his master commended the dishonest manager because he had acted shrewdly; for the children of this age are more shrewd in dealing with their own generation than are the children of light. And I tell you, make friends for yourselves by means of dishonest wealth so that when it is gone, they may welcome you into the eternal homes. Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much; and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much. If then you have not been faithful with the dishonest wealth, who will entrust to you the true riches? And if you have not been faithful with what belongs to another, who will give you what is your own? No slave can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth."

THE CELTIC CREED From Iona Abby Worship Book. If you prefer to affirm your faith using the Apostle's Creed, it may be found on page 96 of the Book of Common Prayer.

We believe in God above us, maker and sustainer of all life, of sun and moon, of water and earth, of male and female. We believe in God beside us, Jesus Christ, the word made flesh, born of a woman, servant of the poor, tortured and nailed to a tree. A man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief, he died alone and forsaken. He descended into the earth to the place of death. On the third day he rose from the tomb. He ascended into heaven, to be everywhere present throughout all ages, and His kingdom will come on earth. We believe in God within us, the Holy Spirit burning with Pentecostal fire, life-giving breath of the Church, Spirit of healing and forgiveness, source of all resurrection and of eternal life. Amen.

For those who in their daily work are stewards and protectors of God's creation in ways large and small; for gardeners, farmers, and ranchers; for rangers and park managers; for fishers and foresters; for climate scientists, ecologists and activists and for all who work to restore and heal our wounded Earth.

Holy One, we pray: hear us, renew us, and strengthen us.

For those we love but see no longer, especially... and for those we now name aloud or silently (...pause...). We pray for those holy women and men who taught us to marvel in all God's works.

Holy One, we pray: hear us, renew us, and strengthen us.

For the many blessings of this life. For the beauty and wonder of your creation and for the knowledge of your presence in the people we meet, in the creatures you love, and for those blessings we now name aloud or silently... (...pause...).

Holy One, we pray: hear us, renew us, and strengthen us.

Glory be to you, our God who is above us, below us, around us, and within us. You are in all things yet contained by no thing. Teach us to search for you in the depths of our being and in the world around us. Strengthen and guide us as we seek to know you and serve you by supporting, tending and healing the good creation you have entrusted to us. Help us to know and serve you in the rhythm of our days, that we may be peacemakers and healers for the sake of your living Christ, the one who forever calls us to newness of life. **Amen.**

May we know your presence in the sharing of this bread so that we may know your touch in all bread, all matter.

We celebrate the life that Jesus has shared among His community through the centuries, and shares with us now. Made one in Christ, and one with each other, we offer these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

On the night of his arrest Jesus took bread and having blessed it he broke the bread and gave it to his disciples, saying "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

In the same way he took wine and having given thanks for it he poured it out and gave the cup to his disciples, saying, "Drink this, all of you: This cup is the new relationship with God, sealed with my blood. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Take this and share it. I shall drink wine with you next in the coming Kingdom of God.

Hear us, O Christ, And breathe your Spirit upon us And upon this bread and wine. May they become for us your body, vibrant with your life, Healing, renewing and making us whole.

And as the bread and wine which we now eat and drink are changed into us, may we be changed again into you, bone of your bone, flesh of your flesh, loving and caring in the world.

A COMMUNION OF THE PEOPLE

All are welcome to come forward to receive Holy Communion. Gluten-free wafers are available in addition to bread. Wine may be received either directly from the chalice or by using an individual plastic cup. Cups are located on a table in front of the first pew on the right as you face the altar. After receiving communion, please deposit your cup in the glass container located on the right as you head back down the aisle.

If you prefer a blessing, please cross your arms over your chest to indicate your desire to the priest.

THE POST-COMMUNION PRAYER

Loving God, we give you thanks for restoring us in your image and nourishing us with spiritual food in the Sacrament of Christ's Body and Blood. Now send us forth a people forgiven, healed, renewed; that we may proclaim your love to the world and continue in the risen life of Christ our Savior. Amen.
